

Lifetimes of experience, wisdom, and heart



"If the Lord has been good enough to give you a profession, you should practice it as long as you can" is a motto Raymond Smith, RN, CRNA and Paula Greenlee, RN live by. Together they have 105 years of nursing experience! Ray and Paula met fifty years ago

in a Tyler hospital when Paula was a student nurse and Ray was an orderly. Paula remembers the starched white hat she wore, and Ray remembers that the hospital had no air conditioning. Their lives and careers diverged, but they reacquainted six years ago and renewed their friendship while working as RNs at Hospice of East Texas HomePlace.

Fifty years ago, Ray set out for the wider world, completing his nursing training at New York University's Bellevue Mills School of Nursing in 1964. He served in the US Army Nurse Corps, and as an operating room nurse in New York City and Houston. After completing training as a nurse anesthetist at Baylor College of Medicine, Ray worked in Houston and Tyler and retired from the anesthesiology department at the University of Texas Health Science Center at Tyler in 2000. Full time retirement was enjoyable, but not fulfilling and in 2008 Ray came to work at Hospice of East Texas HomePlace part-time.

After completing her nursing training in 1958, Paula stayed

closer to home. She married the love of her life, Wayne Greenlee, and had a full life in East Texas as a wife, mother of three, helper to Wayne in his business and full time nurse in local nursing homes, and hospitals. Paula joined the part-time staff at Hospice of East Texas in 2004.

Ray and Paula have seen many changes in their profession through their long careers. "Disposables are a blessing!" Ray asserts. "You can't imagine how many hours we spent cleaning syringes and other things that now we can just throw away." Both agree that advances in technology have improved medical care in many ways, but they are also adamant that nursing is not just a science. "It's art too," says Paula, "and it has to have heart in it. A lot of heart." That's why both love working at Hospice of East Texas.

"I've been an RN for 55 years, and in hindsight I wish more of those years would have been with Hospice of East Texas," says Paula. When her beloved Wayne was a patient at HomePlace, the care hospice provides took on a whole new meaning for Paula and her family. "It is a beautiful and wonderful place and my family and I were so grateful and thankful for the memories that were created in room 401 and beyond."

Although Paula has just retired from Hospice of East Texas, Ray continues to work part-time. We are grateful that these caring professionals brought two lifetimes of experience, wisdom and "heart" to share with the patients, families and staff at Hospice of East Texas.

Jackie Clewis, Nancy Gardner and Jessica Hensley are certified nurses assistants and each has worked for Hospice of East Texas for more than twenty years. Twenty years is a long time in any job. It's an especially long time in a job that can be challenging—mentally, physically and emotionally.

Every day, Jackie and Nancy and Jessica travel the highways and country roads of East Texas. They journey many miles, from patient's home to patient's home, from nursing home to nursing home, to care for the dying. They bathe their patients, wash their hair, put lotion on their skin, change their sheets. They bring comfort and dignity, conversation and a little cheer, consistently and constantly, even when those they are caring for don't know them or even perhaps realize they have been there. Jackie and Nancy and Jessica have done this work, this ministry, with skill and compassion every work day, day in and day out, month in and month out, year in and year out...for more than twenty years.

These thankful words convey so eloquently why The Hospice of East Texas CARE Fund was established... so that Hospice of East Texas can be there for every patient like Jim.



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
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
