

These days, at their home in Tyler, Carole and Will Jennings feel calm and peaceful. It may all be so very different from days gone by – days filled with music and celebrity, travel and excitement – but they've reached a place of quiet acceptance. They are thankful for the past, and they are content with today.

Can you hear the melody and maybe even sing along to *Up Where We Belong, Tears in Heaven, My Heart Will Go On,* or *Higher Love?* These are just a few of the more than 500 songs written by Will and performed around the world by some of the most talented artists of our time - Joe Cocker, Eric Clapton, Celine Dion, Steve Winwood, Whitney Houston, Dionne Warwick, and the list goes on. Will's songwriting gift has earned him national and international acclaim, including Grammy and Academy Awards, installation into three songwriter Halls of Fame, as well as deep respect and admiration. For most of us, that kind of life experience would be hard to imagine – one of such success and renown. But Will remains humble, and now he and his wife are happy to be in East Texas where it all began – for them both.

Will attended Tyler Junior College, Stephen F. Austin State University, and was a teacher at the University of Wisconsin, before his dream of becoming a full-time songwriter led him to Nashville, Los Angeles, and London. He and Carole built a beautiful life together. Years passed and, ultimately, it was chronic and debilitating illnesses which brought them back to where they could be near family – a family that takes care of its own. Will's two older sisters, Gloria Townsend and Joyce Hudnall, both live in Tyler and are grateful for that privilege.

As their health issues progressed, Carole and Will were referred by physicians to hospice care. Gloria and Joyce knew that, for them, there was only one choice: The Hospice of East Texas. The moment the expert, compassionate team arrived, Joyce says she knew they had an ally...

Having navigated Will's and Carole's health journeys the best they could, the family was becoming more overwhelmed, as needs intensified. They were comforted when The Hospice of East Texas began coming to their home – a place of familiar surroundings – where a new kind of healing could begin. Joyce says, "The Hospice team of physicians, nurses, and aides have made order out of our chaos and moved us out of crisis mode. 

Will is a true gentleman and cherishes family above all. Is it any wonder he is so easy to love and care for? That sacred task has been elevated and made more effective with the tender assistance of Hospice."

Called to Serve

On a recent Saturday morning, a charter bus pulled up to The Hospice of East Texas... out poured over 30 young women, clad in bright pink t-shirts – the newest members of the Junior League of Tyler – Provisional Class #74. We were the first stop on their history tour, as part of their Provisional Retreat, learning about community impact.

How fitting, of course, they found their way to our campus.

The Junior League of Tyler founded The Hospice of East Texas in 1982, and we are honored to share a history of togetherness.

The Hospice of East Texas began with one woman's vision... Evelyn Lake visited a friend in Arizona, who was receiving hospice care. That was in the late 70s/early 80s, when very few had even heard the word "hospice." Mrs. Lake returned home to East Texas with the certainty that our community needed that same kind of specialized care for those dealing with life limiting illnesses. Her spark caught fire with the Junior League of Tyler, especially since one of the primary tenets of hospice care was the involvement of volunteers. The League voted to make The Hospice of East Texas its signature project, committing \$30,000 and countless hours of volunteer time to start the organization in 1982.

Volunteers created The Hospice of East Texas and philanthropic support was critical to its early foundation and sustainability. In fact, the entire budget of the newly formed organization came from private dollars, long before Medicare or insurance covered hospice care.

Forty + years later, volunteerism and philanthropy remain as the bedrock of our culture by a *founding commitment* to serve every patient and family who seek our unique brand of care, regardless of their life situation, financial circumstances, or the complexity of their care.

On that September morning, we toured a beautiful group of women through HomePlace, The Hospice of East Texas' in-patient facility – the only one of its kind in the region – and together we were reminded of the deep significance of this rare gem, a true gift given by our community to our community. It only takes a spark... and, with courage and love, it becomes a light to help others find their way.

Together, they drove out to a home set on twenty or so acres. The family had lost their mother earlier in the year. All the siblings had agreed, they wanted to donate the contents of their mothers' home to The Hospice of East Texas new estate sale initiative. Dave, Greg and a few others loaded the truck and lovingly transported many of the donor's beautiful things to our Resale and Estate Shop.

"Why do you do this? Volunteer so much of your time here at Hospice?"

"We always know someone is going to benefit from whatever we are doing at The Hospice of East Texas. It's about the culture of this organization. All the people here seem to know the reason we all do it – to help ease the burden for patients and families" Dave replied.

"You never leave this place without being thanked at least twice. The staff and other volunteers are so grateful and that seems to flow from the gratitude the people who come to Hospice have for the care they receive."

"There is sincere compassion here. We are so proud of our association with The Hospice of East Texas. The quality of people involved here – we just like being around and associated with people like that" Maureen emphasized.

"People love this place and are happy to make personal

sacrifices for the benefit of others" Dave continued. "Greg Brown, who I love working with, will work until 10 p.m. at night the day before – he'll get his work done early – so that we can meet here in the morning and go pick up a donation. His mom passed away on The Hospice of East Texas services a few years ago and this place means a lot to him."

"What are some of the highlights of your 10 years of volunteering?"

"One was definitely when our granddaughter, who's 12, called us to come pick up three or four bags of clothes for the Resale Shops. She knew all about Dave's volunteering and well, like they say, more is caught than taught!" Maureen shared.

Dave remembered, "Another neat time was when our grandson Cade volunteered with me to get his service hours for confirmation. He was working towards a goal and we could do that together. It's a memory we will always share." The Lemings still enjoy the picture Maureen took that day of Dave and Cade on the Hospice truck.

"Yes and we still have that garden decoration in our flowerbed that you got at the Resale Shop!" exclaimed Maureen smiling.

When they retired to Tyler about ten years ago they asked around for recommendations of where they should volunteer. That was the start of their volunteering for The Hospice of East Texas. Throughout their service they have visited patients at home and cooked meals for the staff – just to show appreciation for the work done. Serving holiday meals to families at HomePlace (Hospice of East Texas' inpatient facility) is another way they enjoy being involved.

It's visionary. The Hospice of East Texas was established by a visionary movement and that vision is still evident today in the people who are involved whether as volunteers or staff.
