

# Their love story began in 1946...

At the age of seventeen, Jesse Stanton, known as J.T. by his family, was attending high school, when he spotted a beautiful young basketball player. Her name was Patsy. She was fifteen years old at the time.

J.T. and Patsy dated only a few short months before knowing they wanted to marry. On September 3, 1946, they eloped.

The newlyweds rented a one-room house in Tyler. Eventually, J.T. and Patsy built a home and settled on Patsy's family land in Whitehouse. J.T. worked at Tyler Pipe for 36 years and did a little barbering on the side. Patsy was a homemaker. Together, they built a beautiful life and raised two sons and one daughter.

J.T. and Patsy remained in that home on family land until February 2024. In that month, they were involved in an automobile accident. J.T. made a good recovery, but Patsy was not able to live independently and was moved to a long-term care facility. After 78 years of togetherness, living apart from one another took its toll... Patsy's health continued to decline, as did J.T.'s.

Patsy came to HomePlace at The Hospice of East Texas in November, and J.T. was admitted two days later. The staff at HomePlace moved a bed for him to her room – reunited. Patsy celebrated her 94th birthday in the room they shared. J.T. had recently turned 96. When asked to what he attributed the success of their 78-year marriage and if he would do it all over again, J.T. did not hesitate. "Yes! Marriage is all about give and take." To come full circle, Patsy and J.T.'s great-granddaughter is a cherished RN at The Hospice of East Texas HomePlace. Serving as a charge nurse, Courtney Wynn has been a precious part of their journey, especially during the tender days and nights at HomePlace. Courtney reflects, "I can remember spending every holiday with my great-grandparents and attending church with them on Sundays during my childhood. They were the rock of our family. They were the constant in all our lives and extremely supportive. I can still picture my Nana sitting in the rocking chair in my living room, holding my son for the first time. That is one of the sweetest memories that I will always cherish."

"My great-grandparents had the most beautiful love story and a marriage that stood the test of time. The idea of them being separated during their illnesses seemed almost cruel to our family. We are extremely thankful for my Hospice of East Texas family that allowed my greatgrandparents to share the same room and be together during my grandmother's last days on this earth. I've always known that HomePlace is an incredible place with the most amazing staff; but this experience has put everything into a different perspective for me. It was really special to witness how everyone here loved on and cared for my grandparents and my family at this time. I am forever grateful."

Patsy Stanton passed away November 19, 2024 at HomePlace. Her husband, J.T., passed away at HomePlace March 26, 2025. Reunited again.





HomePlace is *home* for patients and families at a very tender time.


